within your own PL plans you hopefully might be encouraged to dedicate some time to developing your own knowledge and skills in H&WB areas that are important to you. Bearing in mind that for PRD purposes we must seek to reflect against GTCS Standards, it is reassuring to note that there is an expectation for *'Promoting health and wellbeing of self, colleagues and the children and young people in my care'* (Standard 1.1 Professional Values, The standard for Career-Long Professional Learning, 2021).

It may be that you have already identified H&WB as an area for development, or perhaps you might have left some wriggle room for flexibility in your PRD plans and are a little unsure about whether H&WB counts!? This is certainly a question we have been asked a few times over the last few months in the course of delivering our PRD and PU information sessions. As a consequence we are aiming to produce another worked example of how we might use The Professional Learning Cycle Model to conceptualize H&WB ideas as part of our own PRD plans. This will be loaded on to the LR area of the EIS Local Association website in due course.

Whilst the EIS is firmly of the belief that members should decide their own PL priorities it is nevertheless very encouraging for us to learn that our employer is also keen to engage with us to explore ways in which H&WB benefits can be specifically delivered to teaching staff. Alison, Martyn and Claire Young, our colleague from Drummond Community HS, recently met with Lorna French to discuss this and a collaborative working group has been founded comprising members of the Local Association and CEC leaders. As you may be aware Claire has in the past delivered some learning in this area and we are hopeful that her expertise can again be put to good use in the forthcoming year. Look out for details.

Learning for Sustainability

Once of the things that I have been thinking about for some time is how best to support delivery of the pupil entitlement to LfS in a more comprehensive way. As a secondary teacher I can see that this is perhaps less challenging for our primary colleagues to achieve? (I'm not saying it's easy!!) But for instance how can secondary school colleagues delivering distinct subjects embed LfS in their learning? Notwithstanding the difficulties, I noted in the CEC SIP document that recently arrived into schools, one of the key outcomes is that: *'Learning for Sustainability is embedded in our curriculum in all classes'*.

Delivering on that pupil entitlement, and indeed meeting the expectation of the GTCS that we do so is indeed incredibly challenging and needs urgent attention. More change is not something that will generally appeal to us teachers, but is to do nothing really an option? Good knowledge and developing our 'Sustainability Literacy' is a good start and many of you might be aware that the GTCS in partnership with Learning for Sustainability Scotland have developed an LfS Hub with 3 self-directed learning modules. The modules contain a variety of learning resources and reflective questions for you to work through and facilitate discussion with colleagues. We know that there is already excellent practice in our schools, and in no way am I proposing myself as an expert, but I am looking for ways to further engage with and support members who are looking to develop their LfS practice, so please let me know. Our work here in Edinburgh will definitely feed into and support the EIS's approach to LfS nationally which is being led by Rob Henthorn our Professional Learning Co-ordinator at EIS HQ.

Financial services

EIS financial services are keen to run an in person drop in event for Edinburgh members to talk pensions, savings and all things financial. Would there be interest in this?

Business Gateway

Last session we ran a learning event with business Gateway Edinburgh. Advice and information on supports available to members wishing to develop business interests away from school was provided.
