
















The resources are READY!



Focus on LGBT+ History Month





Throughout February 2022, explore the waves of LGBT+ liberation around the globe. <u>Download the Action Pack now.</u>

LGBT History Month takes place in February every year and offers the chance to connect and to reflect on the past and present of the LGBT community. It's an opportunity to celebrate LGBT culture and progress towards equality over time, and to explore what the lessons of history can teach us for the future. While LGBT Youth Scotland creates the annual theme and co-ordinates its website and event listings, LGBT History Month can only exist with your support. The events which take place throughout the month are delivered by community groups, schools, volunteers, activists, and organisations from the private, public and third sectors. Anybody can take part, and everyone who decides to host an event, however big or small, whether online or in-person, helps to make LGBT History Month what it is. The theme is intended to inspire, engage and provoke conversation — what that looks like is entirely up to you.

THIS YEAR, WE'RE INVITING YOU TO THINK BEYOND BORDERS.

- To consider that, while Scotland has made great strides towards equality, the journey has come at a slower pace in some parts of the world, and faster in others.
- To recognise that the direction of travel has not always been linear; the waves of progress have ebbed and flowed.
- And to ask ourselves: what is Scotland's place within this global movement?

Right now, our friends in countries like Poland and Hungary are faced with a rising tide of anti-LGBT rhetoric and a rollback of their human rights. In 69 UN member states, including a majority of African nations, LGBT people are still criminalised under homosexuality and "cross-dressing" laws, as well as being targeted under numerous other offences. The Council of Europe has recently pointed to the UK as one among several countries where the advances of recent years are "under threat" amid "extensive and often virulent attacks on the rights of LGBTI people", particularly in the form of "anti-trans narratives". We know that no country, including Scotland, has yet reached the destination of protecting and championing the rights of all LGBT people, and no country is immune to the backlash against progress. As a global family, LGBT people and allies live in fragile times. Against this backdrop, we encourage you to come together and reflect on the power of people and the strength of solidarity across borders.

In February 2022, take part in LGBT History Month by blurring borders and exploring the waves of LGBT liberation and community across the globe.

LGBT Charter Funding

The City of Edinburgh Council have partnered with LGBT Youth Scotland to support all schools in the local authority in their aims of ensuring all schools in Edinburgh are welcoming, inclusive, and equal spaces for all students. As part of this initiative City of Edinburgh Council are funding secondary schools within the local authority to go through the LGBT Charter programme over a 3-year period between 2021-2023.

Born out of young people involved with LGBT Youth Scotland who wanted to see sustainable change in their learning environments, the LGBT Charter is a 12 to 18-month framework which supports schools and organisations to become more inclusive of LGBT people and identities. During their journey, schools review their policies to ensure they are inclusive, have relevant training, and deliver LGBT-inclusive campaigns alongside young people. This 12 to 18-month programme is designed to support schools by providing the training and the framework to support LGBT young people, staff, and families.

LGBT Youth Scotland are so excited to be working with teachers and staff at primary and secondary schools in Edinburgh on their training and supporting them to create inclusive environments for LGBT young people in the area. The passion and commitment of young people, teachers and school staff never ceases to amaze us.

12 secondary schools and 3 primary schools within Edinburgh are currently undertaking the LGBT Charter programme, with several more due to begin the programme at the start of 2022. Many of

these schools have undertaken activities such as increasing the amount of LGBT inclusive books in the school library, ensuring that LGBT people are represented in the school curriculum and providing safe spaces for LGBT young people and allies through lunch time groups. Additionally, all schools undertaking the LGBT Charter programme will receive LGBT Awareness Training from LGBT Youth Scotland to ensure staff are increasingly confident in supporting LGBT young people, staff, and families.

LGBT Youth Scotland is currently supporting these schools in their journey through 1-1 support meetings and providing access to a shared LGBT Charter Hub with numerous resources. One of our recent resources was a lesson plan and materials for International Pronouns Day which includes a presentation, teacher notes and pronoun badge templates. Several schools have engaged in awareness raising events to discuss LGBT identities, history, and discrimination. Students within the City of Edinburgh have participated in making pledges to contribute to an inclusive classroom environment through events such as LGBT Poster making or flag signing to raise visibility within the school.

Young people from some of these schools have been sharing their experiences of the LGBT Charter programme and LGBT inclusion by speaking at a Scotland-wide LGBT Inclusive Education event which took place in September of 2021. The young people at this event expressed how increased LGBT representation in schools has made them feel safe and supported. Pupils discussed how some new build schools are including gender neutral facilities and that they have witnessed increased visibility and representation of LGBT people in the school curriculum.

Schools have had the opportunity to share best practice and advice whilst on this journey through group meetings hosted by LGBT Youth Scotland. This has provided opportunities for the schools to showcase the impact their work has had on learners and share the progress being made across the local authority.

Several schools in Edinburgh have already completed the LGBT Charter programme and will look at upgrading their Award within 2021-2023. We asked schools who have completed the programme to describe the benefits the LGBT Charter has had in their school:

Sharing Good Practice: Castleview Primary School Wear a Skirt Day

On 4th November 2021, a pupil-led celebration of equality at Castleview Primary School hit the headlines nationwide and sparked TV and radio debates about gender roles. Castleview's P6 pupils decided that they wanted to lead their school in supporting the #ClothesHaveNoGender campaign after learning about the importance of breaking down gender stereotypes. The

#ClothesHaveNoGender started in Bilbao, Spain in 2020 after a male student was expelled from school for wearing a skirt and his male teachers supported him by challenging gender stereotypes by wearing skirts themselves. P6 pupils wrote to Castleview's Senior Leadership Team to ask if they could organise their own Wear a Skirt to school Day. Castleview PS school leaders responded enthusiastically and supported the pupils to develop their ideas and involve the whole school, taking to Twitter to express their pride and encouragement.





Pupils of all ages and genders were delighted to take part in Wear a Skirt Day, as were their teachers. Many parents supported the initiative and shared their children's pictures on social media with messages of encouragement such as

"My children attend this wonderful school.
They are confident young learners who are
encouraged to be unapologetically themselves
and to accept and love others for who they
are. Well done Castleview."

Alongside these overwhelmingly positive responses, there was an element of predictable backlash in certain sections of the media. Rather than being disheartened by this, the school used these responses to support learning, analysing the media reaction in class.

Focus on World Hijab Day

February 1st, 2013, marked the first annual <u>World Hijab Day</u> (WHD) in recognition of millions of Muslim women who choose to wear the hijab. The movement was founded by New Yorker Nazma Khan, who came up with the idea as a means to develop understanding by inviting non-Muslim women and non-Hijabi Muslim women to experience the hijab for one day.



By opening up new pathways to understanding, Nazma hopes to counteract some of the controversies surrounding why Muslim women choose to wear the hijab.

Nazma reflects, "Growing up in the Bronx, in NYC, I experienced a great deal of discrimination due to my hijab, 'she reflects. 'In middle school, I was 'Batman' or 'ninja'. When I entered University after 9/11, I was called Osama bin laden or terrorist. It was awful. I figured the only way to end discrimination is if we ask our fellow sisters to experience hijab themselves."

It's estimated that people in 190 countries take part in World Hijab Day every year. WHD has many volunteers

and ambassadors worldwide to conduct WHD events in order to bring awareness about hijab. These ambassadors come from all walks of life. In addition, WHD has been endorsed by many world renowned individuals including scholars, politicians, and celebrities worldwide. In 2018, the Scottish

Parliament also hosted a three-day exhibition to mark the day. Many politicians including Nicola Sturgeon-First Minister of Scotland, showed support to World Hijab Day.



Think Equal is a global initiative which calls for a system change in education, to end the discriminatory mindset and the cycle of violence across our world and ensure positive life outcomes for our children. Together with world experts, Think Equal has designed a programme to teach social and emotional learning to early years (3-6-year-olds). We ask those who have a duty of care to our children: "how can it be deemed compulsory for a child to learn mathematics, but it is optional for that child to learn how to value another human being or to lead healthy relationships?".

The Think Equal programme has been created by global thought leaders in the fields of education, psychology, hu-



man rights and neuroscience, and comprises three age-appropriate levels, each containing 22 to 24 original narrative picture books, 90 lesson plans and accompanying resources. It has been designed and scaffolded based upon evidence gathered over the past six decades about what constitutes high-quality, powerful intervention with lifetime effects.



SYP Election Results

The Scottish Youth Parliament is the democratically elected voice of Scotland's young people. Since the SYP was established in 1999, members have worked tirelessly to deliver the kinds of change to society that young people want to see.

Edinburgh now has eleven new Members of the SYP representing our young people. Ten of those elected are from state schools in the city, seven are young women and three are from a black and minority ethnic background. One remaining seat, in Northern and Leith, will be contested in the new year. We are proud to say that Edinburgh registered the highest number of expressions of interest from potential candidates and fielded the most candidates (26) of any local authority. We also achieved the highest voter turnout in Edinburgh since 2015 with 2,500 young people voting, despite many of the usual campaigning activities being curtailed because of the pandemic.

I know they all have a lot to offer their communities and the causes they care about most, and I can't wait to see what they do next and look forward to working with Edinburgh's newest group of elected representatives to place young people at the heart of policy and decision making.
