

Action Research : An introduction

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Definitions

Action research is a family of practices.

It is not a methodology but an orientation to inquiry

that seeks to create participative communities

in which qualities of engagement, curiosity, creativity, innovation and question asking

are brought to bear on practical problems.

(Derived from Reason & Bradbury, 2008)

The link between theory and Thepractice

Theory is not something that can be applied;

Rather it emerges from practice itself.

* Praxis – linking theory and practice 'knowing doing' rather than tacit knowing

* Phronesis – practical wisdom



Typically

Action researchers engage in cycles of action and reflection.

The action phase is the gathering of evidence

Reflection phase makes sense of this and plans further actions.

No gap between knowing and doing.

Questions

Action research nearly always starts with the question:

How can we improve this situation?

People who do action research often have a commitment to :

* human flourishing

They believe in

* being participatory and empowering others.
